From the Pastor's Desk: October 2022

"... let us then make every effort to do what leads to peace and to mutual edification."

- Romans 14:19 (NRSV)

Weather-wise, October is one of my favorite times of the year. The crispness of the air, the color of the foliage, the smell of pumpkin-spice lattes: they're all fantastic.

But October also carries with it one of my least favorite things: an abundance of political ads. They've been going on for a while by now, but October is when they really intensify, with election day just a month away. And most of them focus not on the candidate themselves, but on the perceived awfulness of their opponent. Candidates on opposite sides of the aisle tend to portray the other as not just bad, but evil: a threat to democracy and our way of life.

This is, of course, nothing new. The politics of mud-slinging have been around just about as long as elections have been held. And the idea that our nation is becoming more and more divided is also not new. I've both written and preached on several occasions about that division. But, as I was searching for topics to write about for this month's newsletter, it seemed appropriate for a reminder that God calls us to be united in Christ, even if we have different politics.

Regardless of our political convictions, we have a common call to serve God. The prophet Micah summarizes what God requires of Democrats, Republicans, independents, and any minority party: "To act justly and to love mercy and to *walk humbly with your God*" (Micah 6:8, NRSV). I italicized the last few words in that passage because that can be the part we struggle with the most when it comes to our political discourse. Political ads (on both sides) tend to ignore that part completely. They tell half-truths about, incite distrust in, and generally demonize the opponent, while proudly portraying their own candidate as the only possible hope for redemption.

It should go without saying that as Christians, our hope for redemption lies not in politics, but in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. And that means that we should be able to love one another across political divides. It also means that we will be called to serve the powerless, the poor, and the stranger among us. Friends, there is no political party that does not fail that calling in some way or another. So, as the month of November approaches, I suggest that we turn the volume down on those ads (or better yet, turn off the TV altogether), and, as Paul writes in his letter to the Romans, "make every effort to do what leads to peace and to mutual edification."

Interfaith Dialogue Commission Rev. Jeff LeCrone, Chairperson

The mission of the Interfaith Dialogue Commission is to build greater understanding between the faith communities of Lycoming County and to help members of our worship buildings grow in understanding of and love toward people of other faiths.

Over the years, we have furthered this objective in various ways, with the primary one being panel discussions in both schools and in the community at large, as well as having a monthly conversation among people of different faiths.

When I am asked if there is biblical justification for doing interfaith dialogue, my answer is a definite "Yes". The biggest example I can think of is in the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37), and not just in the story itself, but in the

context of how and why it was told. I won't retell the whole thing here, but I encourage you to read it and consider the following:

- Jesus considers the question of eternal life tied to the extent to which we love God and neighbor.
- To elaborate, Jesus told a story about someone who loved across boundaries of religion and culture.
- The hero of that story was a member of the Samaritan community, which was considered to be a corrupt version of Judaism. They were considered religious outsiders.
- By choosing someone outside of his own faith community as the hero of his story, Jesus was demonstrating not only that one should love people outside of our religious circles, but also that we can look to some of them for an example of how to demonstrate that love.

We are not always going to agree with our interfaith neighbors on issues of theology. But being in relationship with them is a way of following Jesus' command to love our neighbor, and it can also help us to find allies in our calling to serve ALL our neighbors and our community. So, we continue the conversation.
