From the Pastor's Desk

Seek the LORD while he may be found, call upon him while he is near; let the wicked forsake their way, and the unrighteous their thoughts; let them return to the LORD, that he may have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon.

- Isaiah 55:6-7

I'm not the same person I was twenty-five years ago. For one thing, I look a lot different. Back then my face was the reverse of what it is now; I was clean-shaven with a full head of hair. People who haven't seen me since then might not even recognize me. But my physical appearance isn't the only thing that has changed. I'm older, (hopefully) wiser, and more experienced than I was then. Even a few parts of my very identity are different. In the past quarter-century, I became a citizen of Williamsport, a Lutheran, and an uncle, none of which was true of me in the year 2000.

The Israel that the prophet Isaiah knew was one that no longer rooted its identity in God. Rather than committing themselves to God's law and to justice, love of neighbor, and righteousness, they had sought to fulfill their own needs, desires and purposes, often at the expense of the weak and marginalized. Then, in exile, under the influence of Babylonian culture and religion, they continued to look less and less like the people God had originally called to be a blessing to the world. So, Isaiah implored them to "Seek the Lord while he may be found", to return to the covenant they had made with God. Theologian Walter Brueggemann refers to this as a "summons to come back to an original identity."

The season of Lent is about reconnecting with our identity in Christ in the midst of all of the things that compete for our attention and our very identities. There are many avenues for us to do this. Some refrain from a type of food or practice to remind them of their dependence on God. Some increase their time in worship (you are reminded of our midweek Lenten services). And others still establish or increase their devotional time, taking time to pray and/or reflect on scripture daily. I encourage any or all of these practices during the coming season.

Whatever our practices, however, Lent is a time for Christ to call out our name and remind us of our identity as people of the Gospel who seek to love God and love our neighbor without limit.

Bonhoeffer was a Lutheran pastor and theologian living in Nazi Germany, who eventually joined the resistance and was arrested and killed before the end of WWII. This curriculum was compiled by Dr. Lori Brandt Hale, an internationally renowned Bonhoeffer scholar and president of the International Bonhoeffer Society – English Language Section. Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania or LAMPa is a partner in distributing to congregations to inspire deeper conversation and discernment about how we live as disciples. <u>Camp Mount Luther</u> is thrilled to announce that construction has started on a new bathhouse for Maple Village at the camp. The new bathhouse will replace aging bathroom and shower facilities. It will include increased capacity, privacy, and accessibility for users. Martin's Construction of Mifflinburg is the

general contractor for the project. The new bathhouse is expected to be ready for Summer 2025.

On the fundraising side of the project, over \$1.25 million has been pledged toward a \$2 million dollar challenge goal. Chad Hershberger, executive director, says the new year has gotten off to an exciting start. "To be able to watch the progress we are seeing the first few weeks of 2025 toward our dream of this new facility has been so rewarding. Even more rewarding has been the outpouring of support we've seen in our fundraising efforts as we work to provide more inclusive and accessible facilities, Hershberger said. The Gift Of Relationships

Relationships are special to all of us.

As an only child, I had to work harder than my friends with siblings to build relationships. But I had the gift of

being in a four-generational family. My relatives often included me in their friendships. Perhaps this was because my grandfather and mother were only children too. They knew how important it was to develop friendships.

I smile as I think about how much I appreciate developing friendships. How important it is to learn names (I'm name challenged) and something about the people.

The children in our neighborhood played together often. Roller-skating, in those old-fashioned skates that clamped onto our shoes, was one of our favorite pastimes. If the weather didn't allow us to be out on the sidewalks, we often skated in circles on our cement basement floor. We did the same thing in my grandparents' basement, around their coal furnace, remembering to duck for a low lying pipe. My grandfather often skated with us there, until he forgot about that pipe on one of the rotations and ended up flat on his back with us kids worried he might be broken.

As we grew, the older children began developing plays for us all to have a part in. I can remember neighbors, grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins from blocks around coming to our shows. Tickets cost a penny for a child and three cents for an adult. If I remember correctly, the audience could buy a snack for a couple cents too. Each year, we chose a different non-profit to receive our donation. I found a clipping recently showing that one year we gave \$47.32 to the School of Hope.

Relationship opportunities come to us wherever we are and in all sorts of ways. They can begin with a wave, a smile, or a "hi." But they don't begin to flourish until you invest some time and a willingness to see someone as important and special.

There is a story about the beginning of Jesus' ministry. People had already begun to follow Jesus. They wanted to hear what he had to teach them about God and to see miracles.

The teaching was accomplished with Jesus in a boat belonging to a fisherman named Simon who, with his friends, had just returned to shore after an unsuccessful night of fishing (Luke 5:1-4 NRSV).

The miracle was accomplished when Jesus urged the fishermen to go out to the deep water and fish again, and "they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink" (Luke 5:6b-7).

The invitation was accomplished after the fishermen's amazement, as Jesus urged them, "'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people.' When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him" (Luke 5:10-11).

The voice of God calls us to make new relationships and strengthen longheld relationships. Please join me in reaching out to our neighbors near and far with God's love and care.
